Physician-Assisted Suicide (SF 1880) was stopped in MN on Jan. 17th. Thank you to all who may have contacted your legislators! You do make a difference.

I attended the Joint Religious Legislative Coalition (JRLC) in Rochester on March 15th. They covered a number of issues that they think are important and wanted us to contact our Legislators on them.

They are as follows:

1. **Affordable, Accessible Child Care for all Minnesota Families**...action on the recommendations of the bi-partisan Legislative Commission to End Poverty in MN by 2020.

The Legislature did not pass a tax bill last year although momentum on Child and dependent Care Tax Credits grew. There was a \$103 million expansion of the credit in Gov. Dayton's budget proposal, and bills from Sen. Eaton and Rep. Loon containing more targeted versions of that expansion (HF 1064, SF 1494). The House omnibus tax bill (HF 848) included a \$35 million expansion that increased the income limit for the credit to \$68,000 for families with two children, and increased the maximum credit to \$2,100. **This year's tax bill should give a \$73 million boost to the Child and Dependent Care Credit.**

2. **Raising MFIP (Minnesota Family Investment Program) Grants**...There should be no poor among you. Support HF 869 (Franson) and SF 734 (Hayden). **Raise basic MFIP grant levels by \$100 per month** by using TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families), federal dollars given to the state, funds for their originally intended purpose. This increase is included in the Governor's budget.

3. **Safe Harbor Funding for Victims of Human Trafficking**...a violation of human dignity. **Support an additional \$5.3 million in the biennial appropriation for Safe Harbor services.** Last year's legislation and increased appropriation was contained in SF 552 (Pappas); HF 1061 (Miller). We expect these two legislators to author the next expansion.

4. **Restore the Vote**...in this Year of Mercy. Support the Restore the Vote Bill, HF 342 (Cornish); SF 355 (Champion). **House leadership needs to be convinced** if this bill is to move forward.

5. **Gun Violence and Public Safety**...balancing rights and responsibilities. For several years the gun debate at the Minnesota Capitol is volatile, anguished, and overly-partisan. **We need to let legislators know that a broad portion of the population supports gun sales background checks to save lives.** Rep. Norton recently introduced legislation requiring comprehensive background checks in HF 2415. It warrants serious discussion inside and outside of the Capitol.

6. **Payday Lending Reform** If you lend money to the needy, charge no interest. Exodus 22 Stop the debt trap with action on payday lending reform. HF 1545 (Hoppe)/SF 1815 (Hayden) is the Governor's bill that limits interest to 30% APR and requires new reporting from payday lenders. This bill needs to move to spark a new debate. **JRLC supports a system of loan caps and cooling-off periods to eliminate the debt trap similar to what almost passed in 2014.**

The Legislators are only in session until May 23.



Greetings to all! There are many projects that we can work on during these cold months and we will update you on the most recent changes. It’s a good time to sew the pillowcase dress, diapers and britches.

At our January Board meeting it was decided to collect items for the Sacred Heart Haiti Missions. There is a warehouse in Rochester, MN. There is a need for many items but especially needed are clean bed sheets, crucifixes, empty medicine bottles with caps, sewing machines and folding chairs at this time. There is a detailed list for more items for The Sacred Heart Missions at the end of this letter. We will not be collecting for the Brother Regis/ Salavatorian Missions but still could give monetary donations. We will continue to collect items for the Rochester Medical Missions.

There is new information for our **Card Front** collection. They do not accept Hallmark, Disney or American Greeting cards and prefer card fronts 5”x7” or smaller.

Both Missions take bandages. You can use worn sheets and pillow cases. Cut 3 inch strips. Each strip should be 10 feet long. Roll 3 strips on one roll to equal 30 feet. This could be a good project for a youth group if they need service hours.
